



Join us this summer for Walking Tours of 1889 Flood landmarks

Museum guide Nick Wuckovich will conduct the tours, discussing Flood-surviving areas, and sharing photographs and stories. He has compiled photographs of victims and survivors, to compare with corresponding homes and businesses. Coupled with the actual 1889-surviving buildings in downtown Johnstown, these photographs provide a unique walking tour experience. This year, Nick has added a Lower Town Tour from Walnut Street to the Stone Bridge, covering an area that was completely devastated in the Flood.

Walking tours will begin at the Johnstown Flood Museum. JAHA Members, and those who already paid to visit the Museum, pay \$3. The price of the tour by itself is \$5. Dates are as follows:
